Flash Flood

The life of an explorer is filled with many hazards, and you are about to witness a true natural wonder: the power of the flash flood!

 Head to high ground immediately. Get out of your car if swept up in a flood. Pay attention to weather reports. Do not enter water. Do not try to outrun water.
- Flash floods do important work in helping the desert environment. Name one good thing
 that happens because of flash floods:
 Flash floods help spread seeds throughout the desert, and recharge the desert ecosystem.
 They also provide water for desert animals such as the fairy shrimp and the red spotted
 toad.

To live to be 100 years old, it's better to hide and not to be bold I'm a **desert tortoise** with a shell all around, living in a burrow underground


I can dig underground for up to three miles, with big buck teeth in my smile

Native American Village


